## Walking Wednesdays are back



COAST kicked off its summer Walking Wednesdays series in March, featuring a different theme and speaker the fourth Wednesday of every month. These walks are a great opportunity to enjoy some fresh air and good company while learning about your community.

We've had an exciting program so far. Architect Anthony Grumbine of Harrison Design led March's walk. He guided our group of twenty walkers to different architectural treasures around downtown Santa Barbara, including the Trinity Episcopal Church, Arlington Theater, Our Lady of Sorrows, and some of downtown's historical houses. The group learned about the different architectural styles that make up Santa Barbara's unique landscape, everything from Spanish colonial to gothic revival.

World-famous architect Jeff Shelton led April's walk. He showed a group of over fifty people his whimsical work around town, including the Cota Studios, El Andaluz, and the Ablitt's House.

May's walk will be a change of pace. Bob Muller, of the Santa Barbara Botanical Gardens, will teach us about Santa Bar-

## Santa Barbara wins Gold Medal

Santa Barbara was awarded a gold medal for its walk friendly policies by [Walk Friendly Communities](#), a national organization. The designation was based on the City's outstanding effort the City to make it an inviting place to walk.

Here are some highlights of this effort: The city has a wonderful walkable central business district that features pedestrian paseos. It has developed progressive planning and policy documents such as the Circulation Element and the Pedestrian Master Plan, takes regular pedestrian counts, has a model Safe Routes to School program participates in the Santa Barbara Car Free partnership that helps tourists arrive and get around in Santa Barbara without a car, and most recently, it has

been implementing a program to install curb extensions, also known as bulb-outs, to make street crossings safer.

It is important to note that the award effort the city made, not any existing conditions. In the nineteen sixties, in reaction to the first suburban mall at La Cumbre Plaza, it decided to convert State Street into the vibrant place it is today and the parking lanes behind the buildings into pedestrian paseos. This came at a time when many other American cities were busy blasting freeways through their old downtowns to open them up to the automobile. It took a great deal of political courage to do this, something I am not sure we could muster today.

From the downtown, the effort has

spread into the neighborhoods. The Safe Routes to School program has brought millions of grant dollars to benefit schools around town, the most recent being the Jake Boysel bike path on Calle Real. Curb extensions were installed in the West Downtown, the Saint Francis neighborhood and the Oak Park neighborhood.

So, are we now all perfect? Of course not. Wherever people and cars share the same public space, it takes constant effort to encourage the more vulnerable users and keep them safe. And this takes as much political courage today as it did back in the sixties. Next time the City wants to install curb extensions in your neighborhood, please remember that it needs your support.

# Remembering Jake Boysel

On Tuesday, May 24<sup>th</sup> Santa Barbara City officials cut the ribbon for the Jake Boysel Multipurpose Pathway, a landscaped trail bypassing the intersection of Calle Real and Highway 154. A very large crowd, including the Boysel family, Council and representatives from the School District, District Attorney's Office, St. Vincent's, SBCAG, Goleta, COAST and the Bicycle Coalition attended the ceremony.



On this very same intersection, on a lovely sunny morning on September 6, 2006 12-year old Jake Boysel rode his bicycle to La Colina Junior High. He never arrived. He was in the bike lane up Calle Real when hit from behind by Ernesto Botello, a City employee on his way to work. He was thrown off his bike, hit the ground and never regained consciousness. His shoes and helmet were torn off, his mountain bike broken in two, his backpack embedded in the radiator grille of the SUV that killed him. Jake was in plain sight with a red helmet on a straight road. The sun was bright and there was moisture on windshields; other than that, there was no explanation.

The enormous significance of the tragedy shook a community struggling to regain a sense of justice. After a hung jury failed to deliver a verdict on manslaughter the District Attor-

ney dropped charges. Had the driver been intoxicated, killing someone in traffic would have been considered a heinous crime; doing it sober was "an accident."

With deep sadness but an overwhelming sense of pride, Santa Barbara came together to celebrate its fallen hero. We thank the volunteers and public works employees that made this possible. To the beautiful family that Jake had, to those who endure what most of us cannot imagine, our sincerest hopes that this path will forever become a place to find peace and a token of solace.

## Bike to School Day 2011
